One week later in the glorious sunlight at a picture perfect Rugby Park, Poverty Bay were the first ever winners of the Bill Osborne Taonga finishing 5th overall putting away Mid-Canterbury 33-26. To our Heartland Captain Kelvin Smith, the team, Co-coaches Maia Nikora and Tom Cairns and Manager Stu Smith the last two matches summed up what we have been striving for as a Union, on and off the field. Everyone connected with PBRFU was immensely proud of our efforts and execution and the manner with which we conducted ourselves. Special mention to NZ Heartland XV team members Stefan Destounis and James Higgins, Team Dr Coll Campbell and Miah Nikora as an 'Observer-Coach',

Congrats to our Heartland Paul Sceats Player of the Year Stefan Destounis who was also a nominee finalist for the 2021 ASB Rugby Awards for Bunnings Heartland Player of the Year.

This result on the field is a culmination of the whole of rugby ethos ably led by our CEO Josh Willoughby and his staff who with a small 2021 team got through a mountain of work.

2021 was another challenging year with Covid implications, gate restrictions, late Representative Seasons and an exhausting time with NZR funding distractions and Silverlake deal hanging in the balance. 2022 will see the continuing challenges of a pandemic however, we are well positioned with the right tools at our disposal.

At a club level I would like to congratulate Waikohu who were again the form team during the year winning the Lee Brothers Shield final 19-5 against OBM. This is the third time in four years Waikohu has come out on top. I congratulate you for your consistent achievements!

Turanga Mana Wahine showed what an exciting and skillful brand of rugby our women play. The two games against East Coast were hard fought and even encounters. I look forward to seeing this grow and more Representative opportunities becoming available for our women players.

FROM THE CEO

"The future of every community lies in capturing the passion, imagination and resources of its people." Ernesto Sirolli

It might seem a bit strange to be quoting an Italian author and public speaker in economic development as an introduction to my report. But what he says and has spent his life working for, aligns with our purpose and journey for not only over the past 12 months but the past few years.

Ernesto Sirolli believes the secret to helping communities solve local problems is, putting it abruptly, to 'shut up, and listen'. Rather than tell people what needs to be done, instead listen and understand what the issues are first, hear about the environment and then harness the passion, determination, intelligence and resources of the local people to make it happen.

We believe the same thing.

I hope our community saw our commitment to this philosophy this past season and shares our belief that our community is amazing and by investing in our own, great things can happen here.

We will not be changing direction. We are furthering our commitment to this journey and looking forward to increasing the investment in our people and resources to listen more and do what our community needs us to do.

No year since I've been in this role was more difficult than this past season – that's saying something after what we all experienced in 2020. It was clear early on in the year that the impacts of COVID would be felt through the year and we would need to continue to adapt.

The constant stretching of resources – financial and physical – was hard to manage at times, in particular the second half of the year as the impacts of COVID began to materialise. The air of uncertainty made it incredibly difficult when planning day-to-day activities and key events. But the resolve of our team and community enabled us to get rugby out on our fields and our community enjoying our great game.

For that, I must congratulate and thank all club committee members for their tiresome work. Particular mention must be given to our club delegates that give their time and energy to our JAB and Council of Clubs Committees, ensuring the integrity of all our competitions is upheld, played under fair conditions and a quality experience for all.

It's impossible for me to put into words just how much we appreciate and respect our volunteers. We feel obligated to do the best we can to pay respect to your work and the work of all our members – we hope our actions this past year have earnt your respect.

GRANDSTAND REDEVELOPMENT

A big thank you for your patience as we continue to work our way through the redevelopment of the grandstand at Rugby Park.

An agreement was signed by the Union and the Government in the middle of the year. At the time of the agreement being developed, a Community Facilities Strategy for Gisborne proposed an outdoor field sports hub surrounding Rugby Park. The proposed outdoor sports hub was at the time informing the general design concept of the grandstand with room to accommodate other sports and codes. However, not long after the agreement was signed, the latest iteration of the community facilities strategy had changed direction away from a hub at Rugby Park and surrounding area.

This change meant the redevelopment of Rugby Park didn't need to consider the hub around it. We have, however, taken the approach to create a facility that has the ability to be built onto – future-proofing the design with possibilities of being part of a hub in the future.

The site was blessed in December in preparation for asbestos removal from the structure before partial demolition.

A lead designer will be appointed in early 2021 with concepts available to the public shortly after.

The facility, which includes turf redevelopment, is due to be completed in time for club finals in 2023.

A huge thank you to the Government, particularly local MPs Kiritapu Allan and Meka Whaitiri, and Shannon Williams of Kānoa – Regional Economic Development and Investment Unit.

Thank you to our funders and sponsors. It goes without saying that without you we cannot do what we do. It was another difficult year trying to provide certainty on what would be delivered on and off the field so we appreciate you standing by us and supporting our rugby community. The support we receive, no matter the size, is always appreciated and valued. We look forward to this next season with optimism that restrictions will ease and you'll have more opportunities to support our game.

New Zealand Rugby is not only our major funder but also our biggest supporter. There is always someone willing to help out when we need it. Thank you to NZ Rugby for its continued support and direction, in particular during such challenging times Mark, Lancs, Doug, Keith, Wayne, Hess and Board buddy Bailey.

PROJECT FUTURE - THE SILVERLAKE DEAL

Much has been said in the public domain about the potential deal between NZ Rugby and private equity firm Silverlake. A summary of where the deal is at is provided. It is intended, each Provincial Union and the NZ Māori Rugby Board will vote on the deal within the next few months.

Under the terms of the agreement, Silver Lake will invest \$200m in a new commercial entity that will control all revenue-generating assets of NZR. The entity will be called CommercialCo and remain under the control of NZR. An additional co-investment of up \$100m will be offered to New Zealand-based institutional investors later in 2022.

NZR said Silver Lake would own between 5.71-8.58% of the established 'NZR CommercialCo' after an additional co-investment later this year. The co-investment will be offered to New Zealand-based institutional investors.

A minimum of \$62.5 million will be offered, with the potential to seek up to \$100 million if parties agree. Silver Lake will underwrite this institutional syndication if it is not fully subscribed.

"This partnership presents rugby with an extraordinary opportunity to secure its future and unleash its true potential," NZR chief executive Mark Robinson said.

"We are truly excited by what we can achieve together with Silver Lakes world class capabilities: from fostering and growing our grassroots, to enhancing the experiences we can create for New Zealanders, and truly maximising our potential on the global stage."

Silver Lake will remain a minority investor and NZR will retain full control over rugby as well as the commercial strategy.

The new NZR CommercialCo entity board will be controlled by NZR and will comprise a new independent chair and other independent directors. The New Zealand Rugby Players Association will also have a seat on the NZR CommercialCo board.

NZRPA chief executive Rob Nichol said the deal represented a "true comprehensive partnership, allowing us to invest together in rugby globally, and establishing the right governance models.

"Silver Lake have shown great integrity and a commitment to getting the right deal in place. They were willing to listen to everyone and understand what rugby means to people in our country," he said.

David Kirk, NZRPA Chairman said: "The partnership is the outcome of long and considered discussions and has been approved by the NZRPA board. This is a pivotal moment for rugby in New Zealand. The agreement provides capital on a sound economic basis and Silver Lake brings additional capability to execute on the new growth opportunities. The proposed investment by New Zealand institutions provides an opportunity and natural pathway for New Zealanders to share in the growth of rugby over time."

In closing, I want to thank the Union Board and staff. Chair Hayden Swann and his fellow Board Members have again given a significant amount of time and commitment to our game and community – a big mihi to you and your whanau for your energy. I have to give particular mention to outgoing Independent Board Member Hayden Green, who has been a tower of support to myself and a great leader of our finance, audit and risk committee, and Marty Bayley, who is leading the grandstand redevelopment work. To our staff, nga mihi nui for another challenging but incredibly satisfying year – I look forward to working alongside you for the coming year and furthering our work for our community.
